Dear Friends and Parishioners of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

I thought I would reflect back within this article on Creationtide from September through to 6 October. It has been a busy but hopefully rewarding and enjoyable time for those that have taken part in the activities and services. Here are some of the highlights of the month.

1. Visit to Waltham Place

Jenny Wilks kindly organised a visit on a lovely Thursday afternoon to Waltham Place. 20 of us experienced a 220-acre organic and biodynamic farm and garden which offers a wonderful chance to explore areas of natural beauty and at the same time learn a little about sustainability and biodiversity. Having enjoyed the walk around the farm and gardens with an excellent guide we were treated to a superb cream tea with scones, fruit cakes, sponges and delicious biscuits. If you haven't visited Waltham Place it is worth taking the time to enjoy all that it has to offer. There is a very good website to browse.

2. Fairtrade Fortnight

During September the Young Saints learned a little about Fairtrade products. The following week in church we shared a themed service on Fairtrade. As you all know we have as our message on our service booklets the 'Ripple Effect' where small actions can make positive differences. In the early part of my time at Bracknell we shared the theme of Fairtrade with young people at our youth club. Two young girls visited a local supermarket and could not find Fairtrade products to purchase. They wrote to the supermarket to complain, and the management team responded to their request to bring products to the store to sell. We discovered through looking at some examples of Fairtrade goods like bananas, chocolate, tea and coffee that we can make a difference by purchasing these goods.

We learned together that Fairtrade has helped people to seek sustainable farming techniques. It has helped through the Fairtrade minimum price to create a safety net by defining the lowest possible price a buyer must pay. The Fairtrade premium is an additional amount of money that goes to a communal fund for producers to use to improve the social, economic and environmental conditions of their businesses and communities. This money can improve education, medicine, and transport to improve peoples' lives. The Chinese proverb 'Give a person a fish and you will feed them for a day. Teach a person to fish and you will feed them for life' is borne out in the Fairtrade idea. Every time you drink a Kingdom coffee at church you are playing a small part in supporting this wonderful work that has been taking place for 30 years.

3. Creationtide Prayers

Throughout the month we hope that you will have noticed the Creationtide themed prayers in church and through Parish news. In worship we are praying to God through our intercessory prayer that we might give thanks for the joys of creation and be mindful that we should protect and work in partnership with God's creation.

4. Trip to Holy Trinity Church, Prestwood

Thank you to Ken Smith for introducing a carload of our sustainability team ,plus my mother, to this incredible church and its energetic priest, Fr Deniel Heywood. We experienced a wonderful churchyard where space has been created for people to enjoy nature, a prayer labyrinth has been designed, and rewilding has taken place.

The Victorian grade two listed church has been turned into a remarkable place to worship with a visual screen and kitchen that can only be seen when being used and the worship area is one of simple but stunning beauty. If you are in the area, it is worth visiting this church as it has become the centre for Prestwood community action both locally and overseas. Another website to view when you have the opportunity.

5. Harvest Weekend

On the Saturday of Harvest weekend, the early part of the churchyard project began. Jo McMullen write, 'The sustainability group are looking at how we can create a churchyard that is more biodiverse, with increased wildlife and native flora, as well as one that is more welcoming to human visitors while remaining respectful of the purposes of the churchyard. Jo continues, 'We plan to reach beyond the church to involve the wider community. This could begin with occasional talks by experts on biodiversity or history in relation to the churchyard. Or perhaps a picnic afternoon to celebrate progress and spot insects.'

That Saturday morning, I took note of the remarkable work of members of the sustainability team, members of the wider church community and from the wider community, Good Gym make tremendous progress as we begin this long-term plan to rejuvenate the churchyard. I would like to thank those people who are weekly making a huge difference to the maintenance of the churchyard.

In the evening about a dozen people gathered at Jan and Mike Moss's house to listen to me share my experiences of the Santiago pilgrimage through Northern Spain. I thank God that every time I share the journey, I am reminded of that time I slowed down and noticed God in my life and in the world around me. Jan and Mike's wonderful food based on Spanish and Portuguese themes made for a special evening. £380 was raised for the Ripple Effect charity.

On Harvest we welcomed Sara to share more information on the work of Ripple Effect. Sara, who originates from Uganda, spoke about the importance of enabling people to learn sustainability skills in farming to help families to feed themselves, learn business skills to set up businesses and raise funding to send children to school. We were reminded again that this is not charitable work but rather enabling people to grow skills for life. (The Chinese proverb resurfaces!)

Following the service the auction took place and thanks to the generosity of the gifts and the overwhelming generosity of the bids we raised somewhere in the region of £650. I know Heinz Baked beans are good on toast with cheese but £10 a can is very generous! I am slightly concerned that for the second year running the guest speaker from Ripple Effect has commented that the vicar has missed his true vocation!

Finally, thanks to Paul Lion, Lorraine Ansell and Jo Sheppard for providing the food and drink for the excellent community Ploughman's lunch. There was a lovely atmosphere as 52 people shared hospitality and brought an appropriate conclusion to an amazing Creationtide period at All Saints.

May we all be blessed by God's love this fortnight.

COLLECT

Grant, we beseech you, merciful Lord, to your faithful people pardon and peace, that they may be cleansed from all their sins and serve you with a quiet mind; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

EPISTLE Hebrews 5: 1 - 10

Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honour, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was. So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, 'You are my Son, today I have begotten you'; as he says also in another place, 'You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek.' In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

GOSPEL Mark 10: 35 - 45

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to Jesus and said to him, 'Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you.' And he said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' And they said to him, 'Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory.' But Jesus said to them, 'You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?' They replied, 'We are able.' Then Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared.' When the ten heard this, they began to be angry with James and John. So Jesus called them and said to them, 'You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. But it is not so among you; but whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many.'

COLLECT

Blessed Lord, who caused all holy scriptures to be written for our learning: help us so to hear them, to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them that through patience, and the comfort of your holy word we may embrace and for ever hold fast the hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. EPISTLE 2 Timothy 3: 14 – 4: 5

Continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work. e presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

GOSPEL John 5: 36b – 47

Jesus said to the Jews: 'I have a testimony greater than John's. The works that the Father has given me to complete, the very works that I am doing, testify on my behalf that the Father has sent me. And the Father who sent me has himself testified on my behalf. You have never heard his voice or seen his form, and you do not have his word abiding in you, because you do not believe him whom he has sent. You search the scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that testify on my behalf. Yet you refuse to come to me to have life. I do not accept glory from human beings. But I know that you do not have the love of God in you. I have come in my Father's name, and you do not accept me; if another comes in his own name, you will accept him. How can you believe when you accept glory from one another and do not seek the glory that comes from the one who alone is God? Do not think that I will accuse you before the Father; your accuser is Moses, on whom you have set your hope. If you believed Moses, you would believe me, for he wrote about me. But if you do not believe what he wrote, how will you believe what I say?'

DRYADS DUO LUNCHTIME RECITAL WEDNESDAY 30 OCTOBER 1.00pm IN CHURCH

We welcome back violinist Carla Santos and pianist Saul Picado, the Dryads Duo, to perform Sonata No. 5, in F major Opus 24, by Beethoven and Respighi's Sonata in B minor.

In 2011 the Dryads Duo was awarded the 1st prize at the "Prémio Jovens Músicos" competition in Portugal. This win gave them the opportunity to record their first CD (GDA) with Sonatas by Janáček, Ravel and Enescu.

In 2016 they released their second CD (KNS), entitled Intimate Colours. It is an important mark in the Duo's career as it includes the piece that inspired the name for the Duo: "Dryads et Pan". This is the name of Szymanowski's third Myth, Op.30. Alongside these beautiful three Myths, the CD also includes Sonatas by Elgar and Respighi. Copies of the CD will be available for sale after the Recital.

Operation Christmas Child was formed in 1990 when Dave Cooke from Wrexham saw the horror of children in Romanian orphanages. He asked his friends to help fill a truck with toys and drive it to Romania.

OCC is now the world's largest Christmas project run by Samaritan's Purse. Since 1990, more than 220 million children in over 160 countries have experienced God's love through the power of a shoebox of gifts. Last year alone, Over 11.3 million shoebox gifts were collected globally

Packing shoeboxes for the Operation Christmas Child shoebox appeal has become an important part of our ministry in recent years. This will be our 12th year of taking part and during this time we have donated over 720 shoebox gifts. Last year, we gave 71!

We plan to follow the same model as last year. There are 3 ways that you can contribute:

Shoebox Online - you can select your gifts online and Operation Christmas Child will pack and send your shoebox for you. We have our own page this year again, so we can track how many boxes we send. Donation –If you're not keen on the online option, you can make a monetary contribution. You can do this by making an online bank transfer or writing a cheque to the church - or by giving cash. Cheques or cash can be left in the small box for this purpose at the back of church – or give them directly to Jenny. If you can donate

£25, the cost of a full shoebox, that would be great, but smaller donations are gratefully received too. Please mark any donations clearly as being for the 'Shoebox appeal'.

As you may remember, there are some items not allowed and these are listed on the website – and it may give you some inspiration too! Please don't bring your shoeboxes to the church.
